IIMPACT currently operates learning centers for over 38,000 girls in more than 1000 villages across 10 states in India. This report is a glimpse of happenings from across these centers. It represents the aspirations of the girls and the progress that they are making in primary education and hence, in their overall development.

LETTER FROM THE CEO

Dear Friends,

Greetings from IIMPACT.

A special thanks to our donors, well-wishers and supporters.

With your support in 2013 – 2014 we were able to reach out to a large number of out of school girls, with your support we have increased our footprint and have educated over 38,000 girls in 10 states of India.

Majority of India still lives in the villages. Quality of and access to education is still a major concern in rural areas. IIMPACT therefore has taken its learning centers to the villages. A girl has to walk for not more than two - three minutes to be in her learning center. We have established relations with people in remote and tribal areas, disadvantaged communities and forgotten villages that are still

divided on caste. It is in these regions that we have been able to change the mindset of the men who were against the education of girls. Today, the skepticism and distrust has slowly been replaced with a sense of community pride and ownership. We have consciously tried to reach out to girls in the far flung areas where children are at the risk of anti social activities such as child trafficking, forced marriage and migration as well as areas affected by natural calamities.

Thank you for helping us empower the girls, their families and communities as a whole. Your investment in girl child education will lead to the nation achieving its millennium development goals.

I must share this anecdote with you. While interacting with a girl in our learning center, I asked her who was the sponsor of that particular center [we have boards placed outside the learning center saying "sponsored by ---"]. She was quick to reply, "I have met Sir. He has played a meaningful and enduring role. My present circumstances may not have evolved into what they are today without his assistance. He may not know me personally, as we are 30 girls in our class, but I will never ever forget him. My grandmother and mother bless him and his family everyday."

We do so little for them, they in return thank us profusely, pray for us and shower blessings straight from the heart.

CHATTISGARH LEARNING CENTERS - PROJECT UPDATE

Survey has been completed in villages of Bilaspur and Raigarh in Chattisgarh. The distance to the project area from Bilaspur is 80 kms and Raigarh is 50 kms. These are mostly tribal villages. The source of livelihood is forest produce. While some areas in Chattisgarh such as Raipur and Korba are progressing due to industrialization, the region is under developed with rampant poverty and unemployment. People from these areas migrate in search of a livelihood. As a result, low participation in education is observed, especially by girls. The project aims to provide quality education to these girls through learning centers established in their village.

Smita Patil & Pune-Running organize a Charity Run for IIMPACT

Ms. Smita Patil (wife of alumnus of IIMA batch of 78), an ardent supporter of IIMPACT, single handedly organized the very successful "IIMPACT Charity Run" at the Flame University Campus, Pune in February in collaboration with Pune Running.

The event was flagged off by Ms. Indira Parekh, Director, Flame University and ex professor IIMA. The youngest participant was 8 years and the oldest over 60 years!

With raised spirits and high motivation, participants helped touch the lives of underprivileged girls in rural India who still do not have access to basic schooling. 'Urja' provided water for the runners and 'Matrix Clothing' the volunteer T shirts.

With more than 450 participants this Charity Run proved to be most beneficial for many young girls at IIMPACT.



I BELIEVE, I CAN FLY... A SUCCESS STORY

Chhoti lives with her family in Jamwa Ramgarh near Jaipur. She studies at the IIMPACT learning center in Class IV. Her father is an alcoholic and hence, unemployed. She helps her mother in hand embroidery work and that is the only livelihood they have. Due to this situation, she could not go to school. She was ten years old when the IIMPACT learning center was established in her village. Chhoti was allowed to go to the learning center only when the teacher went and met her parents. Now, she is a regular student at the center. After completing 3 years at the center, she



can now read books, solve addition, subtraction and multiplication problems in Mathematics, identify the English alphabets and form simple words. She is really fond of playing different games at the center. She aspires to fulfill her dreams. She ensures that her household responsibilities do not interfere with her studies. She respects her teachers and is a very well mannered student.

IIMPACT's donor and friend, Mr. Paul Gleeson sponsors her center. During his last visit he interacted with the girls of the center. He later sent an encouragement letter addressing these girls to which Chhoti has sent a handwritten reply thanking him for her education.

PRIMARY EDUCATION COMPLETE !

In the month of March 2014, a total of 7195 girls passed class V from the IIMPACT learning centers. This is a brilliant achievement keeping in mind that all these girls are essentially those who have never been to school before IIMPACT stepped in for their support. Over 70% of these girls are continuing their education beyond class V. The easy access to the IIMPACT learning centers are proved to be big boon for these girls.

U.P PROJECT REVIEW

Mr. Junned Khan, Director (Programmes) - IIMPACT with Mr. Abhishek Gaur, Project Officer - U.P & Mr. Surender, District Facilitator, conducted an extensive review-visit of the projects in Jaunpur, Mirzapur, Shravasti and Shahjahanpur in Uttar Pradesh from 26th to 31st March 2014. During this process, visits were conducted to the learning centers to assess the level of the girls, level of the teachers, and progress made by the project. Staff and community meetings were organized to take their feedback and suggestions. The field level staff accompanied the team during their visits and meetings.

ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED UNDER THE IIMPACT – SARLA RESOURCE CENTER FOR QUALITY EDUCATION

Assessment Papers

Assessment papers for class III, IV & V were made for all IIMPACT centers. The learning levels of the girls were kept in mind while preparing the assessment sheets. Most of the questions were supported by colorful pictures and interesting figures to make them more specific and meaningful.



Workshop on fun induced methods of teaching

A one day workshop was held with teachers at Nuh, Mewat to introduce new teaching techniques, specifically for the English language. The teachers spent a fun day learning rhymes and developing TLM using local resources. Some of the things they learnt were: how to make a calendar, a clock and easy ways to draw animals such as elephants, lions, cows etc.



Quarterly Training

A number of training programmes took place between January - March. The trainings were based on a multi-level system of teaching and other innovative methods being used by IIMPACT. Teachers were guided in detail on how to make TLMs, organize various activities for the girls and make education more qualitative and easy.
