Each teacher got a chance to share the progress and present status of the children and that of their respective Learning Center.

Activities Conducted Under the IIMPACT - SAR LA TRUST Resource Center (RC)

The objective of the Resource Center established by IIMPACT and Sar La Trust is to support IIMPACT-Girls Education Project through training and curricular enhancement. A large number of activities are taking place every month under the aegis of the RC. Over 24 quarterly trainings were organized during the last quarter in different project areas itself. The RC overlooked the training content, training relevance and training effectiveness vis-à-vis the learning



outcomes planned for each child in IIMPACT's programs. Some Training initiatives need a special mention here. A Mathematics training for 25 teachers in Gajapati, Orissa that helped teachers make children learn through very innovative and attractive methods. Level evaluation and level teaching trainings covering class I to Class IV that were organized at Mayurbhanj, Orissa, Alwar Rajasthan, South 24 Parganas and Murshidabad at West Bengal, Kishanganj at Bihar, Pakur at Jharkhand, Shahjahanpur, Jaunpur and Shravasti at Uttar Pradesh. A very attractive and effective training on Foundation Course and TLMs was organized at Shepur in Madhya Pradesh.

Mobile Science Van Programme Reaches Shahjahanpur (Uttar Pradesh) - Supported by ING Vysya Foundation

On its third anniversary, IIMPACT's Mobile Science Van project reached another district of Uttar Pradesh, Shahjahanpur. The project was formally launched on 15th August at the District. Supported by ING Vysya Foundation, the Mobile Science Van project has already benefitted over 3000 girls in the neighboring Sitapur District from 2010 onwards. Now the project has been shifted to Shahjahanpur to bring Science Awareness among the children and communities in this area. The Mobile Van was launched at the Vinoba Bhave Sewa Ashram here in the presence of Mr. Junned Khan, Director

Programmes, IIMPACT and Mr. Ramesh Bhai, Founder of Vinoba Sewa Ashram. The Launch programme was marked by various cultural items presented by the teachers and children and speeches by the staff members on how they will benefit from the Science Initiative. On this occasion, from IIMPACT, Mr. Abhishek Gaur, Project Officer, UP, and Mr. Mukesh Saini, Project Incharge, IIMPACT - VSA Girls' Child Education Programme along with the entire team of IIMPACT – VSA Girls Education Project were also present. The Executive Director of VSA, Mrs. Vimla Behan, shared with the participants that our great freedom fighter and visionary and the source of inspiration behind Vinoba Sewa Ashram, Acharya Vinoba Bhawe, was a great proponent of Science Education and Girls Education for Indian kids.

Learning Centers in Backward Areas – Challenges vs. Achievements

A social study of the tribal areas of Odisha (Orissa) was conducted during the last quarter. IIMPACT runs learning centers in several tribal locations. Gajapati, a backward district of Odisha, has always struggled with issues such as malnutrition, drought, child-trafficking and poor health. Most of the girls coming to the Centers are engaged in household work and in taking care of siblings during the absence of parents who are out earning a living. The local people constantly face problems in getting work and making ends meet. In the absence of viable livelihood options they are mostly dependent on pastoral occupation, further threatened by depleting forest covers. Children are the worst victims of hunger and malnutrition. The scattered population in hamlets poses a big challenge for the schemes like MNREGA and Mid Day Meal.



Under such conditions, the setting up of IIMPACT Learning Centers close to the girls' habitation has brought new hope by involving girls in a meaningful education. In scores of villages the learning centre is proving to be a first step to education as the existing schools have remained inaccessible. In spite of these challenges the attendance of the girls in these Centers is remarkable i.e. 100%! This is because of their love for education. They are eager to learn and to fulfill their dreams.

A Story of a Very Special Child - (from Dehradun Learning Centre)

An ever-smiling girl, 6 years of age lives in Timli Village. She has three brothers and sisters. Her elder brother is the only earning member in the family and takes care of their basic needs.

At birth, she was extremely weak but somehow doctors managed to save her life. After one and half years her parents noticed that she did not behave like other children. Gradually they were told that she was differently-abled and would need great care. However she proved everyone wrong.



Like any other child her age, this young girl likes dancing and playing. Her mother talks about her special qualities with tears in her eyes- "My daughter understands everything. Even though she cannot communicate with words, she uses her hands to express herself. She recognizes her family members. Though she often forgets the way to her home, she never misses coming to the learning centre".

Her teacher is very happy with her and says that she is the brightest child at the learning centre. Initially she did find it hard to understand and follow instructions; however she has gradually devised her own ways to understand everything that is being said. She is as capable a learner as all the other children around her. Her teacher says that, "She is a delightfully mischievous girl who never sits quietly".

Her mother is also a very brave lady. She has full faith in her child. She looks forward to the day when her child will also become successful in life, like other children.

Uttarakhand Floods: IIMPACT's Response

The last quarter saw the ruthless ravaging of this State by the unprecedented floods. Thousands of people lost their lives, livelihoods and everything they possessed. The sudden devastation has left behind a very long struggle for the people. The worst affected are the villages and within the villages the children. It is difficult to reach the villages high up in the mountains as the roads have been washed away. Soon after the devastation IIMPACT had sent a team to study the situation in the affected areas of Uttar Kashi and Rudraprayag. It is in these locations where IIMPACT has started Learning Centers for children affected by the floods. In the absence of schools, these centers provide great relief for the children as they can now spend their time learning while their parents are busy putting their lives back together again.

IIMPACT Australia

The Counsel General of India in Sydney Mr. Arun Goel was the Chief Guest at the launch programme organized to mark the occasion. IIMPACT's CEO in India, Mrs. Nirmla Tandon, made an emotional appeal for support via a Skype video-link from the IIMPACT office in Gurgaon. She confirmed that the first cheque from Australia would go towards funding a Learning Center near New Delhi.

Today, their sponsored Learning Center, Diegueno Daughters, has been up and running since she was in Grade 4. Mirai's support has grown with each passing year. Now in class 9 at Pacific Ridge School in the US, Mirai continues to inspire her peers. She has founded an organization of her own – "A Million Knots" and has raised
